While in Israel for MISTI, I also embarked on a side trip to Jordan with four other MIT students. We took advantage of the Jewish holiday Shavout to visit Wadi Rum, Petra, Wadi Mujib and Amman.

Wadi Rum was simply amazing! We had a local Beduoin guide and our tour was a mix of Jeep drive through the dessert, rock scrambling/hiking, and an overnight stay in a Beduoin camp. Our guide, Omar, was very sociable and humorous. He had picked up 5 languages while growing up and doing the tours for tourists all over the world and also studied in Japan briefly.


Petra, known as the eighth ancient wonder of the world, was also fascinating because all the buildings are carved out of the reddish stone, which is quite beautiful. The scale was astounding and architecture is interesting in that the Nabateans (ancient people who lived there) had combined multiple architectural styles into their own.

In Amman, the most fascinating thing for me was the stark contrast between men and women's dress. I think Amman is relatively more Westernized compared to other Arab cities, but all the local women was always fully covered and often escorted by a male relative who was in Western clothing (T-shirt and shorts). Some women were fully covered in black burgas; some wore hijab with traditional dresses, some with more colorful Westernized outfits. Since they can only expose their hands and feet, I noticed that footwear became a way to express their fashion tastes in public.

Overall, Jordan is a beautiful and fascinating country, and definitely worth a visit!

Lila: I'm not allowed to eat desert all the time.


Ho-Jun: My favorite non-desert food is fried chicken.
